In an informational article from the National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN), it said some parents are reluctant to admit that children experience the violence, saying they were asleep, or at school or didn't know what was happening.

Talking to Young Children about Domestic Violence - Break ...

In 1995 one research revealed that both impulsive and reflective young adults showed increased amounts of violent aggression towards play objects after playing violent and non-violent video games. However, in a contradictory study it was found that there was not a difference between children that were exposed to violent media and those who were exposed to non-violent media.

The Psychological Effects of Violent Media on Children ...

There's been a lot of debate over the issue of how exposure to violent video games and other violent media content, such as in movies and TV shows, affects children. Many studies indicate that violence in media may be a risk factor for development of aggressiveness in some kids, reduced caring about others, increased confrontational and disruptive behavior , and other antisocial behaviors.

Violent Video Games and Aggression in Kids

Developmentally inappropriate information can cause anxiety or confusion, particularly in young children. Adults also need to be mindful of the content of conversations that they have with each other in front of children, even teenagers, and limit their exposure to vengeful, hateful, and angry comments that might be misunderstood.

Poor social skills, low academic achievement, impulsiveness, truancy and poverty are among the factors that fuel this violence. This violence can be prevented by developing the life skills of young children.

Preventing violence by developing life skills in children ...

Caregivers can also help children learn the social skills they need to deal with bullying when it occurs. To gain and maintain friends, and avoid becoming involved in bullying, young children need to develop three types of social skills. 1. Social problem-solving skills: Find concrete ways to teach children the skills they need to solve problems.

Teaching Social Skills to Prevent Bullying in Young Children

We know that for the most part, children learn from both experience and social learning or role modeling. Therefore, when children, especially young children, see violence on television, they have a difficult time differentiating between what is real or what is make believe, and tend to emulate or copy what they are seeing.

Violence on TV and How it Can Affect Your Children ...

Young children are especially vulnerable to the effects observed violence. Psychologists have recently applied these findings towards teaching non-violence to young children and their caregivers. Their research reveals that since violence is learned, nonviolent ways of interacting with the world can also be learned.

Preventing Violence by Teaching Non-Violent Problem-Solving

Many parents and teachers of young children share Ellie's concern that children should be shielded from learning explicitly about race and racial differences. Adults often worry that introducing these topics too early could be harmful (Husband 2010).
